A Neighborhood Crime Watch program is a great way to bring citizens and law enforcement together to decrease crime and make a community safer.

The program counts on citizens to organize themselves and work with law enforcement to keep their eyes and ears open at all times.

Close-knit communities usually report less break-ins, thefts and overall crimes when a proper neighborhood watch program is in place.



How to Start a NEIGHBORHOOD CRIME WATCH



Form a small planning committee of neighbors to discuss the Crime Watch concept, the needs, the level of interest, and possible challenges.

Contact your local police or sheriff's office to gain credibility and to add a good source of training and tips. These agencies are the major sources of information on local crime patterns and crime prevention education.

Contact your Vector Security branch.

Gather facts about past crime activities in the area.

Hold an initial meeting to define the purpose of the program, and begin to identify issues that need to be addressed. Invite a Vector Security representative or a law enforcement officer to your meeting.

Publicize your meeting at least one week in advance with door-to-door fliers and follow up with phone calls the day before.

Elect a chairperson to coordinate local activities.

Ask for "Block Captain" volunteers to keep up-to-date information on residents; make special efforts to involve the elderly, working parents, and young people; and relay information to members on their block. Block captains also can serve as liaisons between the neighborhood and police.

Hold regular meetings. It's a great way to get to know your neighbors and their

lifestyles. Having an opportunity to handout packets of information and tips is crucial since crime happens so often. Don't forget events like National Night Out or a potluck dinner that gives neighbors a chance to get together.

Remind Crime Watch members that they are simply alert, observant people who care about the community, not the police.

Sponsor cleanups, encourage residents to beautify the area, and ask them to turn on outdoor lights at night. Physical conditions like abandoned cars or overgrown vacant lots contribute to crime.

Celebrate successes! Recognize volunteers' contributions through such events as awards, annual dinners, and parties.

Sponsor meetings that address broader issues such as drug abuse, gangs, self-protection tactics, isolation of the elderly, crime in the schools, bullying, and rape prevention.

Partner with Vector Security to provide neighborhood crime watch signs for the area and work with local municipalities in hanging these signs.

Partner with Vector Security to provide home security for any members interested in additional security measures. Vector Security will provide yard signs and window decals for all customers.
